# Marine Safety (Temporary service) Exemption 2017

I, Gary Prosser, Acting Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Maritime Safety Authority (the National Marine Safety Regulator under section 9 of the *Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law*), make this instrument under subsection 143(1) of the *Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law*.

#### 1 Name of instrument

This instrument is Marine Safety (Temporary service) Exemption 2017.

#### 2 Duration

This instrument:

- (a) commences on 1 February 2018; and
- (b) ceases to have effect at the end of 30 June 2020.

## 3 Repeal and transitional matters

- (1) Marine Safety (Temporary service) Exemption 2013 made on 21 June 2013 is repealed.
- (2) However, a temporary service permit issued under *Marine Safety (Temporary service) Exemption 2013* that is in effect on 31 January 2018 continues in effect until the permit expires.

### 4 Application for temporary service permit

A person may apply to the National Regulator for a temporary service permit to perform duties for which the person is required to, but does not, have a certificate of competency for a voyage or a period of time.

 $Note \ 1$  For the form of application and how it will be processed, contact the National Regulator.

Note 2 National Regulator is defined in the Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law — see section 6 of Schedule 1 to the Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law Act 2012.

# 5 Exemption

- (1) The person is exempt from the requirement to have a certificate of competency to perform the duties if the National Regulator:
  - (a) is satisfied that the person is, for the voyage or the period, competent to perform the prescribed duties or functions in relation to the vessel; and
  - (b) issues, in writing, a temporary service permit for the person to perform the duties for the voyage or period of time without the certificate.

Note A fee may be charged — see section 9 of the Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law Act 2012.

- (2) The permit may be issued for up to 30 days.
- (3) The National Regulator may make the permit subject to further conditions that take account of the local conditions of the waters in which the vessel is to operate.
